THE NATIONAL WRITING PROJECT BASIC ASSUMPTIONS

- The university and schools work together as partners, believing that the “top-down” tradition is no longer acceptable as a staff development model.
- Successful practicing teachers are the best teachers of other teachers, having credibility no outside consultant can match.
- Summer Institutes involve teachers from all levels of instruction, elementary through university, as well as teachers from across the disciplines; writing is as fundamental to learning in science, mathematics, and history as it is in English and the language arts.
- Writing needs constant attention and repetition from the early grades on through the university.
- Teachers of writing must also write; the process of writing can be understood best by engaging in that process first hand.
- Real change in classroom practice happens over time.
- Effective staff development programs are ongoing and systematic; they bring teachers together regularly throughout their careers to test and evaluate the best practices of other teachers and the continuing developments in the field.
- What is known about the teaching of writing comes not only from research but also from the practices of those who teach writing.
- The National Writing Project, by promoting no single “right” approach to the teaching of writing, is open to whatever is known about writing from whatever source.
